A Note From Our Chaplain, Rev. Roy Horning...

This year's convention theme is "Mary's Call to Prayer in Modern Times". Mary asked the Fatima children to pray and that message is certainly relevant and asked of us today. One of my first principles about the spiritual life is that it must be rooted in prayer and the sacraments. My reasoning is that prayer is first and foremost communication, or conversation with God. Every healthy interpersonal relationship is rooted in communication either through words or actions and this is especially true of our relationship with God. The Catechism of the Catholic Church (everyone should have a copy of this at home) says that prayer is the elevation of the mind and heart to God in praise of his glory; a petition made to God for some desired good, or in thanksgiving for a good received, or in intercession for others before God. Through prayer the Christian experiences a communion with God through Christ in the church. The Sacraments are God's gift of Himself to us and a participation in the very life of Christ our Lord. The Catechism states that the sacraments are an efficacious sign of grace, instituted by Christ and entrusted to the Church by which divine life is dispensed to us through the work of the Holy spirit. The Sacraments (called "mysteries" in the Eastern Church) are seven in number: Baptism, Confirmation,

Eucharist, Penance, Anointing of the Sick, Holy Orders and Matrimony. Thus, I am continually reading what the saints have to say in regards to prayer and participation in the Sacramental life of the Church. Why 're-invent the wheel' when the masters have left us road maps to get to our destination? Regularly, I find nuggets of gold that I pass on to you through homilies or bulletin articles. I recently read about spiritual insights that St. Julian of Norwich gained through a life of solitude lived in a cell attached to St. Julian's church in Norwich. She was born in 1342 and lived well into the 1400's. Julian probably took her name from the church which would have been about 400 years old at the time. She became an anchoress after receiving a series of sixteen visions of the Lord during a severe illness in 1373. As an anchoress, she was a woman dedicated to religion and permanently lived alone in a cell (room) attached to the church, hence the name 'anchoress'. She spent twenty years reflecting on the visions she had received and recorded them and their meaning as The Revelations of Divine Love, which is recognized as one of the great classics of spiritual literature. One of her more memorable quotes embodies the whole of her spiritual teachings and speaks to her belief that we should see God primarily as all loving. Julian was convinced that "all shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well".

A Note From Our Chaplain...(cont'd from pg. 1)

Julian's insight on intercessory prayer is so clear and beautiful that I reprint it here for your benefit and meditation: "A simple way of intercession is the way to awareness. The first step is to become aware that God has been working long before we came on the scene ourselves, that He is working now and that our desire is to be linked with Him within the communion of saints in this work. The second tip is to hold the intercession request in our hands and to let all our awareness enter into it. I do not say concentration, as that might suggest strenuous mental effort and that is not what is required; just awareness as we might stand in the presence of a picture or sunset. The third step is to put the slip aside and just be in God's presence. We do not now have to reflect that we are there on behalf of another; what has already been done makes that clear. We just are in the presence of God, our intention-again we do not have to reflect upon it now-being that God's love shall flow freely in this other, as our hope is, it shall be in ourselves."....."All intercession is ultimately gathered up in this saying of an Eastern monk, "Every morning put your mind into your heart and stand in the presence of God all the day long". Bishop Michael Ramsey has written that the word 'intercession' means not pleading with God, but standing in God's presence on behalf of another. It can be a help to grasp this, for it follows that to pray for others we do not have to be clever or eloquent or even perceptive of their needs; just ourselves as we are, simple, a bit confused perhaps, but wanting God's will, or wanting to want God's will for ourselves and others. It is God's business to take things from there. We are to fill the water pots with water-and we are to fill them to the brimthe wine-making is His. We are to remove the stone; 'Lazarus come forth' belongs to Him. We are the dry bones; the clothing with flesh and the breathing upon them is His." There is so much wisdom and humility in this simple lesson on intercessory prayer. ~Fr.
